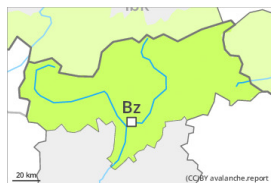


Danger Level 1 - Low



Tendency: Constant avalanche danger →
on Tuesday 07 03 2023

Low avalanche danger will prevail.

Winter sport participants can release avalanches only in isolated cases.

The somewhat older wind slabs are unlikely to be released now. They are to be evaluated with care and prudence in extreme terrain, especially on very steep shady slopes.

Avalanches can additionally in very isolated cases be released in the weakly bonded old snow at high altitude. These avalanche prone locations are to be found in particular on very steep shady slopes and at transitions from a shallow to a deep snowpack. They are very rare but are difficult to recognise.

In many places there is a danger of falling on the hard snow surface.

Snowpack

Danger patterns

dp.6: cold, loose snow and wind

dp.1: deep persistent weak layer

The somewhat older wind slabs have bonded quite well with the old snowpack.

In very isolated cases weak layers exist in the centre of the snowpack, in particular on steep shady slopes at high altitude.

Some snow will fall on Monday in some localities.

Tendency

The conditions remain favourable.
